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Did You Know? The Trumpeter Swan is the largest water fowl species on the Continent. They weigh in at 26 pounds with wing spans exceeding 7 feet. At one time around 1918 they were becoming extinct. There were only 69 known in the Greater Yellowstone Area. But with aggressive intervention and Migratory Bird Protection laws enacted the swans have made a comeback. Today it is estimated that there are 63,000 birds in North America. Of that area, the birds in the US still face threats. There are about 923 birds in the Rocky Mountain Population (RMP) and of those 185 are in Wyoming. Efforts continue today to preserve, protect and grow the population of these beautiful majestic birds.
