

Communications and Public Relations Chairman Pat Stenback Article from the GFWC International - Spread The Joy - Post Your Pictures Vicky Ann Trimmer 2018-2020 GFWC Communications and Public Relations Committee

A great way to communicate with your club members and the community is to use social media. Posting pictures of your club doing activities tells your story for you. The photos show the great work your club is doing. Almost as important, from a membership perspective, they show how much fun your clubwomen are having while working in your community.

The same rules for good print pictures apply to good social media pictures:

1. Know how you intend to use the image - if posting horizontally - take the photo that way. Resizing to go from horizontal to vertical often results in distorted photos.

2. Set your camera resolution to its highest possible setting.

3. Consider the composition of the photo. What is the message you are trying to convey? Who and what needs to be in the image to get your message across?

4. Consider the audience's perspective. What will the photo say to them? Action shots are good but sometimes the posed one gets the message across better. Not all negative space in a photo is bad. It can force attention to the important part of the image.

5. Frame the photos. Is the background good? Is the space too cluttered? There is nothing worse than taking a "great" photo and then realizing there is a telephone pole coming out of someone's head!

6. Take lots of photos. Use the automatic button and just keeping shooting. It may be the 33rd photo in a series that is the "perfect" one. In the digital age, we can delete them if we don't like them.

Be a little cautious, however, when posting photos because not everyone wants their photo on the internet. Keep in mind these "rules" to live by:

1. If you are having an event, ask attendees to sign a waiver permitting use of their image. This is extremely important if there are minors in attendance. If someone indicates they do not want to give permission, simply give them a slightly different name tag so you know to remove them from a photo before posting it. For example - all name tags could have a yellow rose and those who don't want photographed would have a pink rose.

2. Never "tag" a person in a picture unless you have their permission.

3. Use strict privacy settings.

4. Turn off your phone's GPS.

5. Remove all "metadata" from your photo before you post it. On most phones and digital cameras, you can change the settings so "metadata" is not collected with the photo. If you have not done that make sure you delete it from the photo file itself before posting to social media.

6. Don't include any personally identifiable information, such as residential addresses, signs, etc.

7. Wait until after the event is over to post your photos. This avoids revealing that someone is not at home.

8. Understand that once the photo is posted - You lose control! Others can "grab" it, alter it and use it without you knowing it. The photo never leaves the internet. Even if you delete it from your page, if I have copied it to my page, it is still on my page! Those "cute" pictures today may not be so cute in 10 years.

A recent GFWC News and Notes article provided information on the Kentucky State President's project -- Raising Awareness and Removing Barriers- Organ, Eye, and Tissue Donation. GFWC-W clubs could follow her lead and begin planning some activities supporting **Donate Life Month** in **April**, encouraging donor registration.

Some statistics to think about:

- Someone is added to the organ donation waiting list every 10 minutes.
- Approximately 20 people die every day waiting for an organ.
- More than 115,000 people are waiting for a life-saving transplant.
- There is no defined cutoff age for donating organs. The decision to use a donor's organs is based on strict medical criteria, not age.
- Most Americans say they support organ donation, but only a small number know how to register. (In Wyoming, those renewing their driver's licenses can register to be organ donors at that time.)


A registered organ donor has the potential to save or improve more than 50 lives. One donor can provide:

Kidneys	Pancreas	Liver
Lungs	Heart	Intestinal organs

Donate Life Month – celebrated in April each year, features an entire month of local regional and national activities to help encourage Americans to register as organ, eye, and tissue donors and celebrate those that have saved lives through the gift of donation.

The National Donate Life Month 2020 theme: Garden of Life is inspired by the springtime scene of a garden and the insects within it serving as symbols of hope, courage and transformed life – themes repeatedly found within the donation and transplant journey.
