I had a wonderful time going to the WSR Conference in Oregon with many laughs, great speakers, and skits put on by GFWC committee members. Much attention was given to



We are very proud here in Wyoming to show membership growth and the creation of new clubs like our Fremont County Ladies. The fall workshop is being held in Riverton in celebration of this new club and I am hoping



that many of you will be there. Everyone from Wyoming was so proud when Laramie Woman's Club member Polly Wade was selected as one of the two winners for the Jennie June Award from the Western Region. New members may not know, but this is the only award sponsored by the GFWC that goes to an individual for her lifetime service to her community. Polly has been a member of the LWC for over 45 years and was instrumental in all the work the club did supporting the Laramie Plains Museum. She volunteered for the club long before she became a member. She also worked

tirelessly supporting youth hockey in the community. There were also various other clubs and needs throughout the community that she assisted over the years as well. The recognition is well deserved. This is the very first Jennie nomination in the 125 years of the Laramie Woman's Club. We wish her well at the International Conference in Chicago in June of 2024.

Important news as the club year starts is that all clubs should be thinking about their end of year reports. Yes, now is a good time, especially for those who were responsible for projects in the first half of the calendar year and now have other responsibilities. Get those reports written and to your Presidents as soon as you can. One thing I would like to request is that everyone put a little more thought into the "why" of your project. Many of our clubs have projects they do every year. You put in your report "because we always do it". Please give some thought to this. You do it because, for example; "The elementary school needs support for reading. Their first grade reading comprehension scores have dropped and we provide support through our annual fundraiser by ....." or "This year we did our usual Bunco Party but we voted to support the Downtown Clinic because they have reported a 150% increase in need this year." This information will help our state department chairs tremendously, when they go to do their jobs in writing their reports to national. If you are responsible for writing a report on a project, please start now and put a little more thought into your answers for why you do the wonderful things you do in your communities.



In closing I wish to share a highlight of my travels to Oregon. It was such a surprise. In the Humboldt Redwoods State Park, there is a California GFWC Grove. That was impressive in and of itself, but when we visited the grove, it was so much more than that. There was a 4-sided hearthstone and a water faucet there making the grove, located by the river, a very peaceful place. The story is that in the early 1900's the effort began to save that ancient grove and after two decades of work the women's clubs of California banded together to make it happen.



Their motto was 'strength united is stronger' and they raised \$45,000 from 60,000

individual members. In 1933 they gathered there to celebrate their dedication to conservation. The Federation Hearthstone, pictured here, was designed by the renowned architect Julia Morgan (1872-1957) who much like our founder had to work hard to achieve elevation beyond her gender in this male dominated profession. The design of the fireplace embodied her desire to build in harmony with nature. For many, a fireplace evokes thoughts of home and family, symbolizing a touch of domestic warmth in the wilderness. This four-sided hearthstone, or fireplace, stands as a monument to preservation.

In the meantime, I hope to be busy collecting checks from the clubs for the scholarship program. They are due by Nov 30<sup>th</sup>. ### **Environment Community Service Program - Phyllis Salzburg, Chairman**



The 2023 Honorable Mention Club Creativity Award in the Environment Community Service Program went to a North Carolina club that supported **The Crayon Initiative**, a non-profit that collects unwanted crayons, melts them down and remanufactures them for art programs at children's hospitals across the country. The Crayon Initiative helps reduce waste heading to landfills by recycling old crayons and brightens the lives of young patients during their hospital stay. The club distributed special collection boxes in their community to places such as schools, day cares, restaurants and had help collecting from scout groups and others. Over seven months, 315 pounds of used crayons were collected and shipped to Crayon Initiative. The Crayon Initiative website gives lots of great information on the organization and how to participate. GFWC is introducing a new National Day of Service for our member clubs to participate in. The concentration this year is Food Insecurity. The Sweetwater County Club is collecting for the local soup kitchen. Fall Workshop participants will be in the inaugural National Day of Service at the meeting in Riverton.



### ***What is GFWC National Day of Service?***

The **National Day of Service** (NDS) is a day in which all of GFWC comes together in service to highlight an area of need, take action to address it, and raise public awareness about its importance. State federations and clubs will participate by organizing Community Service Programs (CSP) in their communities as part of NDS. It's also a great opportunity to invite guests to participate and introduce them to GFWC.

### ***How can you help solve food insecurity in the United States?***

To initiate the planning process, GFWC encourages you to contact your local food banks and food pantries to find out how best to be of service. For example, a club can sponsor a food bank, pantry, or food program to organize a volunteer activity with fellow club members, family, and friends.

### ***Who should you invite to participate?***

Use the activity to motivate and inspire your friend(s) to join GFWC. The benefits of community service not only make a person feel good, but it helps to build meaningful friendships and bonds that will last a lifetime.

### **Ideas for NDS Activities:**

- Volunteer at a Local Food Bank
- Food Drives: Connect directly with the local food bank to determine how your club can be of service. They will welcome the support and donation of time and food.
- Raise Awareness About Hunger: Reach out to your local media to introduce NDS and the cause being promoted. Also, use social media to discuss food insecurity with members of your community, clubs, schools, church groups, and others.
- Advocate to End Food Insecurity: Use GFWC's Legislative Action Center (LAC) to interact with your federal and state elected officials to advance a bill or introduce legislation that helps to end hunger by funding programs specific to the issue.




